From the Desk of Pastor Rebecca

And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. (Genesis 2:2-3)

September often signifies a return to business-as-usual, or rather "busy"ness-as-usual, with regard to our over-packed schedules. In light of the frantic pace so many of us live by, it's important to remember that rest is literally a commandment of God. It is not something we only earn if we have run ourselves ragged the rest of the week, and it is supposed to be available to all people (Ex 20:8-11). There are even Sabbath laws commanding rest for farm land and animals (Lev 25:2-4).

Although we usually think of "the Sabbath" as one of the days of the week, the Bible also talks about Sabbath *years*, which you can read about in some of the previously cited Bible passages. A preacher once suggested that if Sabbath is a set of values, not a specific unit of time, then "isn't it possible to have Sabbath hours in our days, or Sabbath minutes in our hours?"

Finding ways to incorporate mini Sabbath practices in our lives can be a meaningful way of nourishing our spirits and fostering a connection with God. Writing down things we are grateful for could be one way to do this. Drinking a glass of water and reminding yourself that Christ is the Living Water will strengthen your body and your soul. Taking a walk, breathing intentionally, or reading scripture could all be mini Sabbaths in the midst of a busy day.

Of course, smaller breaks of five or ten minutes do not make up for a schedule that is hectic and anxietyinducing the rest of the time. God's desire that we have ample rest challenges the ways we structure life for ourselves as individuals and churches and societies. "Sabbath" is not simply a synonym for "Sunday." The command to honor Sabbath should make us ask questions about whether "faster" is always better, whether "more" is always a sign of success, and whether rest (or even leisure) is something we are making accessible to all people regardless of their station in life.

Your value is not found in what you produce. The number of appointments and events on your calendar does not define your worth. It is good to be connected and it is good to create, but remember that God commands rest–not just for select people, but for everyone on earth and even for the animals and the land itself.

Walter Brueggemann summarized it like this, and I pray it will be a blessing for you to read: "In a society defined by production and consumption, there are huge gradations of performance and, therefore, of worth and significance. In such a social system, everyone is coerced to perform better—produce more, consume more—be a good shopper! [This] creates "haves" and "have-nots," significant and insignificant, rich and poor. But Sabbath breaks that. On the Sabbath you do not have to do more. You do not have to sell more. You do not have to control more. You do not have to know more. Because this one day breaks the pattern of coercion, all are like you, equal—equal worth, equal value, equal access, equal rest."


<u>The Sunday School</u> youth will be singing in church fairly often! I will be working with them on some new songs as well as old favorites that the congregation is invited to join in on.

PIN. It was so quiet, you could hear a PIN drop. PIN the tail on the donkey. Please enter your PIN to use your Debit Card. PIN a corsage. Wear a PIN. After my leg fell asleep it felt like PINS and needles. We have all used these phrases and know the word PIN can be used as a noun or a verb. It can be an inanimate object or an action.

In quilting PIN can be both. We use straight PINS to PIN a seam before sewing. Sewing or straight PINS are used for specific uses and there are many different types of PINS. But this month we



will not be using any of the straight PINS. We are going to use quilt basting PINS. And while they look like a safety PIN and are used like a safety PIN. Quilt basting PINs have a curved profile to allow easier use.

Please join us September 10th at 1 p.m. in the Sunday School Wing for a PIN basting party. And, you don't have to have any sewing experience! If you can open and close a safety PIN, you are invited! We will be using the quilt basting PINS to PIN baste the backing, batting and quilt top of the 60th Anniversary Quilt to ready it for the quilting process. 
"The Altar", in <u>Selected Poetry of George Herbert</u> (1967) Signet Classic Poetry Series, The New American Library, New York.

Interested in a Group Discussion about "The Chosen"?

"The Chosen" is a series about the life of Jesus Christ, his disciples, and other people surrounding him. The series stays true to the gospel accounts of Jesus' life, teachings and miracles, but the back-stories of the disciples and others are fleshed out and told in interesting ways and, at times, even with humor. In episode one, we meet Mary Magdelene, the fishermen--Simon, Andrew, James and John—Matthew, the tax collector, and Nicodemus. The series shows them prior to their meeting Jesus and how their lives are profoundly changed after they meet him.

Each episode is 50 to 60 minutes long. You may watch the episode at home before we meet, **but** there will also be an opportunity to watch it at the church where it will be shown one hour prior to the discussion group. We will be starting with season one, episode one, moving to another episode each week for eight weeks. We will meet in the church parlor to discuss what we saw, thought, and experienced while watching it.

The group discussions will start at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, September 23rd and we'll meet each Monday through November 11th. If you would like to watch, or re-watch, the episode that will be discussed, come at 6:30 to watch the video on DVD. (Popcorn will be served!)




Council would like to acknowledge and thank all of those people that have been involved with property and grounds updates that have happened throughout this year so far.





Food for thought from Jeremiah 29:11-13 (NIV) Jeremiah 29:11-13 God knows our true needs, and God's plans for us are good.

I look forward to September and a new school year starting with our new idea for Children's Church. I invite you to get involved with the new Children's Time during church. This is an old idea from Pastor Paul's time and a new idea since it will replace the current Sunday School time. It is an idea, and hopefully this is an idea that will meet the children attending church's needs. My goal is that it will be based on one of the readings during the service, and will include an interactive exchange between the children and the adult, with a puppet to help them feel comfortable answering, and follow-up activities to be completed independently at the children's table or to be taken home to complete later in the week. This dialogue can also help adults better understand the meaning behind God's word and how it can apply to our lives. <u>September 22</u> will be our first Children's Time. <u>After service</u>, the children will participate in Backpack Sunday, where children will stuff backpacks for children abroad, and pick apples for the food pantry at Atonement Lutheran Church.

Imagine planning a lesson for children, where an architect interrupts the lesson.

Leader: Good morning, everyone! Today we're going to talk a bit about "plans." You know, plans are important . . .

Architect: (Suddenly interrupting, walking up with a large box and a bunch of blueprints.) I couldn't agree more! In fact, that's why I'm here today, myself, to talk to you about plans!

Leader: Excuse me, but I'm not sure I know you.

Architect: What? WHAT? You've got to be kidding! I'm one of the most famous architects in the country! I've come up with plans for everyone, EVERYONE who's ANYONE!

Leader: Oh. Interesting. No offense, but I don't think we're talking about the same kind of plans . . .

Architect: OF COURSE WE'RE NOT! My plans are not just ordinary plans. Mine are spectacular! Amazing! Fan-tabulous! Here, let me give you a little sample of what I'm planning for your church. Opens up a large blueprint.

Leader: But . . . we were going to talk about plans for the future.

Architect: RIGHT! Exactly. Now, look here. These are my plans for the future of your church. As I thought about what would work, I thought, "Future . . . future." Then it came to me. Future . . . SPACE! (Looking dreamy.)

Leader: Uh-oh. I don't think I like the sound of this.

Architect: (Pointing to blueprint.) Look here, a space theme would be great for this big, cavernous place. You could have planets hanging from the ceiling, and we could knock out this wall here and make, like, an entrance to a spaceship, and electronic space music could continuously pour out of those speakers and . . .

Leader: (Shaking head.) No. No.

Architect: (Not listening, getting very excited.) And the best part is . . . THIS. Handing over the box. Just for you!

Leader: (Warily.) What's in here?

Architect: (Delighted.) It's only . . . your very own HELMET! Like an astronaut would wear! Isn't that just AH-mazing?

Leader: Listen, I'm really sorry to disappoint you. Clearly, you've put a lot of . . . um . . . thought into this. But when I said "plans for the future," I didn't mean building plans!

Architect: What? WHAT?

Leader: You heard me. I wanted to talk to the kids about God's plans for their future. Didn't you hear the reading from Jeremiah? "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope."

Architect: But my plans were about the future! And mine were . . . exciting!

Leader: I know, I know. But God's plans are exciting too. And do you know why?

Architect: (Sullenly.) Why?

Leader: Because God has a plan for each person's life. Each person! We may not know what it is, but we know that God's plans for us are good. Therefore, we can have hope, and we can face the future with confidence and courage.
