## **Mission Statement**

### From the Desk of Pastor Rebecca

As often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

(1 Corinthians 11:26)

After the sections of Gathering and Word, the third part of the pattern for worship used in most liturgical traditions is the Meal. This refers to the Lord's Supper, the sacrament of Holy Communion.

The Meal section begins with the collection of our financial tithes and offerings while the table is set. This placement has pros and cons. There is a danger of having it appear that the offering is like paying the price of an admission ticket to receive the sacrament, but this is not the intent. Because Holy Communion emphasizes our unity as the Body of Christ and the abundance of our Lord's mercy, keeping the collection close to the Meal is supposed to remind us of how we are called to share all our resources, supporting one another and remembering that everything we have comes to us from God in the first place.

Limiting myself to just a few hundred words about Holy Communion is incredibly difficult. I came to love the sacrament during a time when I was forced to fast from it. When I was a missionary in London, I was placed with a Roman Catholic community, and despite all the time we spent building a team of service and love, I was not allowed to receive the sacrament from them. It hurt to have that line drawn between us, but I believe that experience of exclusion taught me a lesson about the value of grace and invitation that I will always carry with me.

Much of the music and prayers that are said during the Great Thanksgiving come directly from the Bible. Christians in the Lutheran tradition believe that Christ's real presence is with us during Holy Communion in, with, and under the bread and wine. This is different from believing that the Meal is only symbolic or (on the other end of the spectrum) that the elements only look like bread and wine, but have actually entirely transformed. Lutheranism says this is not an either/or situation, but a both/and mystery. Together we consume bread and wine and the body and blood of Christ.

For more than 500 years, our sacramental theology has declared that scripture and faith live in a beautiful in-between place. When our human impulses are to explain, categorize, and cling to certainty, Holy Communion reminds us that mystery and paradox are foundational parts of our faith. The Sacrament of the Altar is a time when all receive the same-when all are united in need for Christ's mercy-when we stand shoulder to shoulder with our neighbors declaring our trust in God's abundance.

Epiphany continues through the entire month of February. As Christians, the season of Epiphany calls us to continuous celebration of the manifestation of Jesus as the Messiah of ALL peoples. We are reminded to share the news of Jesus as the "Light of the World" as we share the good news of the gospels through our words and actions.

February is also Black History Month ; for the past several years we have highlighted the musical contributions of African Americans during this month. We sing some of the wonderful spirituals that came out of the period of slavery, and also gospel and praise songs of more contemporary composers.

On February 2nd, the Hand Bell Choir will be performing "Jesus is a Rock in a Weary Land" based on a spiritual that can be found in the ELW hymnal # 333. Spirituals were used to provide spiritual solace and a sense of community during times of oppression and hardship; they were also a way to help preserve African cultural heritage through the rhythms used, and frequent use of "call and response" type singing.

In addition to some spirituals, we'll be hearing other songs and compositions from African American composers throughout the month in appreciation of the rich contributions they have made to worship.



### KING OF KINGS QUILT GROUP

Wrapped in a quilt is like getting a warm hug from the quiltmaker. Children especially like their blankies for warmth and a feeling of familiarity. Speakers from various care groups from the Syracuse area tell stories about children who do not have some of the basic necessities, let alone a cuddle quilt. These organizations appreciate donations of quilts because the need is great. A speaker from the McMann Ryan Advocacy Center has given quilts to children for comfort, who then has asked, "Is this really mine? Do I have to give it back?" The group "Sleep in Heavenly Peace" has volunteers who make and assemble beds for children who have never had a bed (members of our congregation have been involved with this worthy cause). They accept donations of new sheets and blankets, but ask for colorful pillowcases. As the beds are being made up with the sheets and blankets, they like to put a quilt at the foot of the bed. Children can use their quilt to snuggle in while watching TV. And, recently I heard Beth Broadway from Faith Interworks tell of refugee families moving into a new apartment, who came with little or nothing to this foreign country. The new families are delighted to see a guilt on their new bed or guilts for their children. They are moved to tears sometimes, looking in wonder at the handmade gift from someone in America that was made just for them.

On Tuesday, February 11, we will meet at 1 p.m. in the Sunday School Wing. We learned a fun and quick "Fold and Sew" quilt block last month that we can use as our quilt pattern to make some darling children's quilts. These quilts will be donated to Interfaith Works of CNY. Bring children's fabrics or

CNY. Bring children's fabrics or colorful fabrics in 10" and 5" squares. Or if you are very ambitious, bring completed blocks to be assembled into quilt tops. Let's give a child a warm hug from us!

Scripture tells us to envision that:


"Everyone shall sit under their own vine and fig tree,


Sincere sympathy to Bob Dumond and his family on the passing of his wife, Diane. May you all know God's strength and peace now and in the days ahead.

And wonders of His love,


And wonders of His love,


